

Hello all!

My name is Christina Rodriguez. For those that do not know me very well, I recently graduated from Hillsdale High School and will be attending University of California Riverside in the fall. I have been a member of St. Ambrose almost all of my life.

This summer, I have been blessed enough to travel to Guatemala for two weeks with my school club, The Hillsdale Effect. Some may know that I tried to go on this trip summer 2018, but unfortunately, there was a volcanic eruption and our club had to cancel the trip for that year. I greatly appreciated all the support from St. Ambrose both last year and this year. This trip was the most life changing experience I've ever had.

The Hillsdale Effect is a club that I had been a member of throughout high school. We raise money to provide microloans to women in Guatemala. This microloan includes business advising, education to run a successful business, and a smaller loan for the woman to be able to purchase something to enhance their business such as a larger stove to make tortillas.

During this trip I was able to meet past women that the club has helped and deliver the microloans to the next group of women. The stories that these women shared were both touching and inspiring. The average education of these women are about elementary school level, so their biggest motivation is to be able to send their children through college so they can live a better life.

I can read all about poverty-stricken nations, but to be able to stay there and see the living conditions of these women left the largest impact on me. It fueled my fire to push for greater change in the world for the future. Despite having so little, these women still work twice as hard as I could ever imagine and that is what inspired me the most.

I wanted to thank St. Ambrose for being the biggest supporters of this trip because without you, I would have never been able to have this incredible learning experience. Thank you for the love, support, and prayers.

Cambodia Academy of Mongkol Borei (cambodiaacademy.org/)

Hans Eide, a Foster City resident, returned to Cambodia decades after the Vietnam war and was moved by the plight of rural Cambodian children who were too poor to attend public school. Hans, along with fellow Rotary Club member John Barrett, founded the Cambodia Academy of Mongkol Borei in 2004. Education is free and entirely supported by charity – a donation of \$295 provides tuition, uniforms, meals, and transportation for one student for one year.

Since 2008, St. Ambrose, Sea Breeze School, and individual members of our community have sponsored students at the Cambodia Academy. Among many other skills, the students learn English, often from native-speaking teachers, and are better equipped to enter the working world than most Cambodian public school graduates.

This is the third year that St. Ambrose is sponsoring Mai Chantra (boy, 14) and Chheng Vipha (girl, 13). They enjoy receiving cards, letters, and pictures from us, especially our Sunday School students. Much is required from those to whom much is given, and much more is required from those to whom much more is given.

Back in my younger days, the students that made up my youth group were seething at our youth pastor as he stood in front of us, burning a twenty-dollar bill.

For us in the 1970s, twenty dollars was a big deal! He would set fire to the bill, let a bit of it burn and then blow out the flame. Repeatedly, he asked us the question: “Is the bill still worth twenty-dollars?” As kids, we thought the youth pastor was crazy! We begged him to stop—to give the money to us or the church—before it was too late and the bill was worthless. We eventually yelled in frustration as the money finally disappeared into ashes. Then, he quietly asked, “How many of you are treating the life God gave you in the same way?” The tone of our group changed immediately as we fell into an introspective silence.

What about you? God has given each of us tremendous gifts of life, talents and abilities. Are these being used as God intended or are they—like the twenty-dollar bill in the youth pastor’s object lesson—being slowly squandered and wasted away?

Unlike burned money, and fortunately for us, God is in the business of re-creating squandered lives. There is no one so far gone that God is not able to restore and rebuild a life. It’s never too late to recognize waste in our own lives, ask God for His forgiveness and grace, and get back on the track of real life, offering ourselves up to God to be used by Him.

Today, take a quick self-inventory. Are you being responsible with the gifts God has given you, or are you allowing yourself to be wasted? Take whatever action is necessary to make the needed changes and to put your God-given gifts to use for the cause of Christ!
