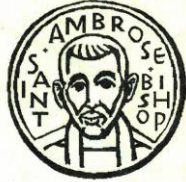

## Reflections from the Interim Rector

Dearest Sisters & Brothers,

As I write this, we are drafting the liturgies for Holy Week and Easter. So many people are working so hard to put the whole event together: the music, the choir, Margie with all the bulletins (reminding me of Lily Tomlin at the switchboard on "Laugh-In!"), the altar guild, the Easter Egg hunt providers, the readers, clergy, intercessors, etc. For those who have never experienced the full Triduum and Easter nor been involved in it, I can only describe it as like putting on "Hamlet" on Thursday, then switching to "Macbeth" on Friday, then switching to "King Lear" on Saturday, and then church on Sunday. All the readings change each day, as do the costumes, the lighting, the programs, the music, etc.

Growing up, my family had no experience of the richness of the Triduum (Latin for "3 Days"). They just went on Easter Sunday out of tradition - and I imagine we even slept in through quite a few Easters. Now, I have a certain regret for people who only experience liturgy at Christmas and Easter without much run-up or preparation. I wish life was only about the big celebrations of birth and life, but alas it is also about suffering, loss, and death as well. How can we truly celebrate resurrection without facing crucifixion? How can we rejoice fully if we haven't experienced the loss as well? It is what gives context.

I once heard two clergy arguing over whether a church should have a Cross or a Crucifix in the chancel. One priest was arguing "I don't want a dead body hanging there every day - depressing! I want an empty resurrection cross". The other, much older, priest said, "There is no resurrection without the crucifixion. I need the reminder that even God suffered like us and because of us. THEN I'll appreciate the resurrection". [They decided on a crucifix].

Make no mistake, we're not trying to recreate suffering. We have quite enough of it as it is (COVID, old age, Ukraine, ad infinitum). But it is an all-the-more amazing transformation to watch God transform suffering and death over three days into joy and new life.

## Reflections (continued)

This will be my last Holy Week with all of you. It has been an amazing journey - and already so much better than last year's with only a few allowed in the church. 'I have longed to have this Passover meal with all of you'. I look forward to going through this journey to Easter with you! I hope to see you all at Maundy Thursday (7:00 p.m.), Good Friday (7:00 p.m.), and Holy Saturday (7:00 p.m.). **Be sure to bring a Bell on Saturday evening to ring in Easter!**

The Vestry approved the Parish Profile and OTM Portfolio at their January meeting and the Search Committee posted the Rector position early this month.

## Hymn for April – by Maureen Fromme

### “This Joyful Eastertide” – Hymn #192

As we head in to April, we will have several more days of Lent, leading us to Palm Sunday, Holy Week, and then EASTER! The children will be looking forward to bunnies and candy. However, we all need to realize the importance of the events in the upcoming Liturgical calendar.

For our hymn this month, I am heading to Easter. The hymn I have selected speaks of the joy and wonder of Easter. The first phrase is, “This joyful Eastertide, away with sin and sorrow.” To that, I tend to say, “AMEN”, especially with having come through Lent and Holy Week and the reading of the scripture lessons describing that period of time. Here is the text of the song (in the attached recording, the order of verses is different):

*This joyful Eastertide, away with sin and sorrow!  
My Love, the Crucified, hath sprung to life this morrow.*

*Death's flood hath lost its chill, since Jesus crossed the river:  
Lord of all life, from ill my passing life deliver.*

*My flesh in hope shall rest, and for a season slumber,  
till trump from east and west shall wake the dead in number.*

*REFRAIN: Had Christ, that once was slain, ne'er burst his three-day prison,  
our faith had been in vain: but now is Christ arisen, arisen, arisen, ARISEN!*

The man who wrote the words and the man who arranged the music knew each other and wrote this hymn together. The text is by Gearge Woodward (1848-1934), an Anglican priest who wrote original works and translated poems from other languages into English. He was ordained in the church of England in 1874 and served in a variety of parishes during his lifetime. The melody is a 17<sup>th</sup> century tune from the Netherlands that Irish composer Charles Wood arranged. He studied at the Royal College of Music, and was taught by Charles Villiers Stanford and Charles Hubert Hastings Parry, both of whom are well-represented in our *The Hymnal 1982*. Mr. Woodward and Mr. Wood worked together in publishing a book of carols for Eastertide.

As you listen to and sing along with the recording, you will find that there are two phrases in the verse section, both of them having the same melody. In the refrain, the word “arisen” is sung four times, each one higher than the one before-- often referred to as 'word painting'. I trust you will enjoy the text and melody of this hymn.

Before the pandemic, Foster City's Earth Day celebration was a large participatory event. Below is the account from 2011:

#### *Earth Day, 2011*

*Under sunny skies, St. Ambrose joined the rest of Foster City in celebrating the Earth Day Fair on Saturday, April 16. In keeping with the theme of "reduce, reuse, and recycle", parishioners donated hundreds of books, CD's, DVD's, prerecorded videotapes, and even vinyl records to be given away or sold at hugely discounted prices. One-of-a-kind items such as a collection of 13 Rocky-and-Bullwinkle tapes and a never-used Betty Crocker electric oven brought foot traffic to our booth. We raised a total of \$395.60, which will go to support Outreach projects such as the Heifer Project, the Rotary Elementary School of Mongkol Borei in Cambodia, and the Youth mission trip. Our thanks go to everyone who donated and especially those who helped to sort the many boxes of items and to set up, take down, and staff the booth. Clara Padilla, Eric and Nicolas Dowdy, Merle Silverman, Kay Huffman, Shelley Keefe, Fe Valentin, Daniel Yuen, and Jay and Lillian Watan and their niece Jena all performed yeomen's work. They represented us well as the friendly face of St. Ambrose to the Foster City Community.*

**Life for us is always busy, always fun and almost always rewarding!**

Registration for Summer 2022 and the 2022-23 School Year opened at the end of January and we have been running ever since. While some of our programs are full, we do have a variety of openings in others. If you or anyone you know is looking for enrollment in the best school in town, please contact us or pass on our contact information.

In an effort to recruit more families to our program and our waiting lists for future years, we held our very first in-person enrollment fair. We opened up the campus to anybody that wanted to come see who we are and what we have to offer. To our surprise, we had 127 people attend the Sunday afternoon event, and we were successful in gaining several enrollments and several leads for interest for future enrollments. To help spread the word, we have been hosting weekly virtual tours followed by live Principal Q&A sessions. We have gained some enrollments this way as well. We updated our website, advertised on Nextdoor and Facebook and, even started flying our big yellow *Now Enrolling* flags at the corner. We call this gorilla marketing and it is proving to be beneficial.

Unfortunately, the talk around Foster City is that while Sea Breeze is an amazing school, the wait list is long and your chances of getting in are slim. Sadly, COVID really impacted our enrollment and we must now work to dispel the rumor and build ourselves back up. We are all working hard and I am confident that all will be well. We are hosting another in-person enrollment fair on the evening of April 7, please spread the word.

It is exciting to share lower COVID numbers and an increase in the child vaccination rate. We have been able to begin to allow families back on campus and are no longer using our valet pick-ups. Families come on campus to pick their children up from the playground or the classroom doors. Everyone is excited about this change and the big kids are looking forward to the possibility of not wearing masks outside soon. Staff and preschool children will continue to wear masks at all times.
